Council Fellowship

The American Geographical Society's (AGS) Council Fellowship program supports graduate students in pursuit of geographic research, especially research that includes a field component. The fellowship is open to all graduate students who are members of the Society. Each fellowship is worth \$1,500 and four will be awarded in the Spring.

The AGS Council Fellowship is now accepting applications for 2019.

Deadline: November 1, 2018

The AGS Council Fellowship program will consider all proposals concerned with any subfield of geography. Although a fieldwork component is encouraged, the program does not require one to apply. Upon completion of the research, fellowship recipients are encouraged to submit an article based upon their research to an AGS publication. Sophia Hagolani-Albov, a 2015 winner, published her research in Volume 60 of Focus on Geography, [read the article here](#).

Proposals should contain the following components:

- (1) A cover page containing the project name, applicant's name, position, affiliation, telephone number, postal address, and email address (500 word count);
- (2) A narrative that outlines the proposed research, specifies the reasons for doing the research by placing it in the context of published work, and describes how results will be disseminated (1,500 word count);
- (3) A bibliography, containing only those items cited in the narrative (500 word count);
- (4) An abbreviated curriculum vitae emphasizing factors that illustrate the applicant's competence/experience in the proposed area of research (1000 word count);
- (5) A budget (maximum \$1,500) itemizing expenses, with brief justification for each expense category (500 word count).

To be considered: An applicant must be a current member of the American Geographical Society and a graduate student. Proposals must be received by the Society no later than **November 1, 2018**.
